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


Six things you should know when planting a tree.

1. Call before you dig— Several days before planting call the national 811 hotline to have underground utilities located.
2. Handle with care— Always lift tree by the root ball. Keep roots moist until planting.
3. Digging a proper hole— Dig 2-5 times wider than the diameter of the root ball with sloping sides to allow for proper root growth.
4. Planting depth— The trunk flare should sit slightly above ground level and the top-most roots should be buried 1-2 inches.
5. Filling the hole— Backfill with native soil unless it's all clay. Tamp in soil gently to fill large air spaces.
6. Mulch— Allow 1-2 inch clearance between the trunk and the mulch. Mulch should be 2-3 inches deep.

Tree Site Selection Tips



Proper Planting Steps

1. Find the point where the top-most root emerges from the trunk. Remove soil from the top of the root ball so that the top-most root emerging from the trunk is at the surface.
2. Dig a shallow planting hole as wide as possible. Dig the hole slightly shallower than the depth of the top-most root and twice the diameter of the root ball.
3. Slide the tree into the planting hole and remove synthetic material. Carefully slide the tree in the hole with the top most root 1-2 inches above the landscape soil. Materials used to transport the tree including twine, burlap, and a basket or container should be removed—unless doing so will void a warranty.
4. Backfill the hole and add mulch. Before backfilling, straighten the tree in the planting hole. Backfill the soil into the planting hole breaking up soil clumps. Apply a ring of mulch 2-4 inches deep extending 2 feet out from the base of the tree. Keep mulch slightly away from the trunk. Water your tree once planted.
5. Stake and prune the tree, if necessary. Staking may be needed to hold roots firmly in the soil especially if you live in a windy environment. Stake the tree until the roots are established, but no longer than one growing season. Light pruning may also be needed to remove broken or dead branches from the tree.

Program Requirements

1. Applicants must reside within the city limits of Woodburn.
2. One tree per household, per year.
3. Renters are required to obtain property owner authorization.
4. Residents who need to *replace* a *street* tree on their property will **not** be eligible for the tree give-away program.
5. Residents who are *adding* a *street* tree to their property must first apply for, and receive a street tree planting permit before eligible for the tree give-away program.
6. Once application is approved, residents will receive a gift certificate to redeem at Al's Garden Center in Woodburn for the tree selected on application.
7. Gift certificate **MUST** be forfeited to Al's staff at time of redemption.
8. Gift certificates will be good for one year from date of issuance.
9. Give-away program will be open Nov-April of each year, or until budgeted funds for the program expire, whichever comes first.

Urban Forestry Program:


- ⇒ Improve the health of City owned trees.


